Open University research suggests there are three important ways to support readers and a love of reading.

Read Aloud





Reading aloud to children shows them that reading is a pleasure not a chore. Children need to see adults as readers too!

Making time to read together helps to develop children's stamina and interest. It also helps to develop your child's vocabulary.

Talking about books is so important and encourages readers. Make connections and invite them to share their views and give your opinions too!

All reading matters! Books are great—but leaflets, comics, recipes and instructions can all be great too. Be on the lookout for reading, wherever it is! **Talk about the joy of reading whenever you can.**

At school, we are constantly reinforcing the importance of reading. Children are read to every day by their teacher. We have regular book babble sessions, where children participate in book talk and share recommendations. Children can borrow books from their classroom and are guided by teachers to books they think they will enjoy. Also, we encourage regular reading through our reading raffle and dedicated daily reading for pleasure time.
