# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

### Aims

At Wath CofE Primary School we aim that disadvantaged pupils are supported through a range of school strategies so that they attend school in line with national averages for all pupils, have access to high quality pastoral support so that feel safe secure and happy in school whilst accessing quality first teaching provision through in class learning and intervention outside class which swiftly addresses specific learning gaps. Our school motto is, 'Aim higher, shine brighter' and this is at the heart of what we do for all pupils but particularly those who are disadvantaged.

### To achieve these aims, we will:

- Enhance quality first provision through a range of CPD opportunities which enable all staff to enhance their practice in ways which are linked to our DEP.
- Ensure consistency in key area of the curriculum through the purchase of an accredited phonics scheme and regular review and coaching from the English Lead in guided reading and Phonics Lead in this area. As well as this, the English Curriculum is being developed to reduce cognitive load and enhance outcomes. The development of this is linked to our CPD programme.
- Plan strategic interventions which are based on research evidence, early intervention, targeted towards the groups of greatest need and using practitioners who can make the greatest difference.
- Enable disadvantaged pupils to have attendance which is in line with national averages for all pupils so they access a full curriculum offer.
- Use a broad network of welfare provision so that all pupils feel, safe, secure, happy and ready to learning whilst ensuring all parents have positive relationships with school.

## Challenges

# Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

## Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

1. To provide quality first class-led teaching to all pupils including those who are pupil premium.

- Teachers are expert teachers of phonics or reading. All relevant staff have been trained in Little Wandle Phonics and received in class training from the phonics leaders. Observation showed consistent, strong practice.
- Teachers engage in action research to develop their practice in other key areas. All teachers engaged in research in either retrieval practice or strategies for modelling writing. This led to more streamlined retrieval practice with vocabulary and knowledge linked and new strategies in modelling writing which supported new writing scaffolds or greater scope for pupil choice.

2. To promote engagement by addressing social, emotional needs and mental health.

- Case studies show that pupil premium children are happy in school.
- Drop-ins show that pupil premium children engage with their learning.
- Behaviour review shows pupil premium children receive the same recognition as other pupils.

3. To close the attendance and persistent absence gap between the pupil premium children and all children.

- Attendance for all pupils was 95.2%. Primary national average was 94%.
- Persistent absence for all children was 11%. Primary national average was 17.2%.
- Attendance for pupil premium children was 91.6%.
- Persistent absence for pupil premium children was 29.5%.

4. To improve pupil premium children's language and literacy skills in the early years and KS1.

- SALT programmes have enabled the children accessing them to come of the SALT programme.
- 64% of pupil premium children in Y1 achieved a phonics pass. 87% of all pupils passed.
- 69% of pupil premium children in Y2 achieved a phonics pass. 92% of all pupils passed.

5. To close learning gaps in KS2.

- All pupils Y4 writing at the expected level at the end of Y3 was 63%.
- All pupils Y4 writing at the expected level at the end of Y4 was 69%.
- Pupil premium Y4 writing at the expected level at the end of Y4 was 44%.
- All pupils Y5 writing at the expected level at the end of Y4 was 62%.
- All pupils Y5 writing at the expected level at the end of Y5 was 67%.
- Pupil premium Y5 writing at the expected level at the end of Y5 was 54%.

- All pupils Y6 writing at the expected level at the end of Y5 was 80%.
- All pupils Y6 writing at the expected level at the end of Y6 was 81%.
- Pupil premium Y6 writing at the expected level at the end of Y6 was 64%.

6. To support the social and emotional needs of pupil premium families.

- There is a designated parent support worker in school.
- Families to support are identified and reviewed at least termly.
- A range of support strategies are deployed to support families in bespoke manner.
